Recruiting participants for a National Study of Forecasting. We are in the process of recruiting knowledgeable people such as yourself (a colleague

in the AEA), to participate in a multi-year study of forecasting. It is sponsored by IARPA (Intelligence Advanced Research Projects Agency). This project is designed by investigators at the University of Pennsylvania and the University of California, Berkeley. It involves a multidisciplinary effort to understand how people use the knowledge they have to develop expectations about the future and what sorts of processes and strategies lead to success. We are starting this spring and will pay you a modest honorarium if you agree to make a few forecasts for us. To see how expectations evolve, we will run through 2013. All we are asking you to do is to visit a website and answer a few questions. These will focus on things like how probable you think it is that a certain event or outcome will happen (for example, a government changing or a financial sector soaring) or how much of something like growth or inflation or civil war you anticipate occurring. We need to recruit quite a few people with interest in and knowledge about world affairs, politics, and global economic matters.
